Schnoor's killer gets life in prison

The man found guilty of manslaughter in the shooting death of former Ringgold county resident Eric Schnoor was sentenced to life in prison recently in Jacksonville, FL.

At the sentencing hearing, Joshua Charles repeated that he did not fire the shot that killed Schnoor but also apologized to the Schnoor family.

Prosecutors said Charles was driving around a Mandarin, FL neighborhood last January, shooting for fun. One of the bullets hit and killed Schnoor.

"Today would have been my 14th wedding anniversary," Rachel Schnoor, Schnoor's wife said at the sentencing hearing. "Our kids remember being tucked in and snuggling up to their daddy, but unfortunately, that's all they can do is remember him because they've been robbed of their privilege of access to their father by someone else's recklessness."

The trail of Charles' co-defendants, Dean Parker, who investigators said was driving the car at the time of the shooting, will be held at a later date.

move the blade from one station to another.

The company is working on patenting the blades and other technology being developed for the new wind turbine.

The wind turbine is designed to work efficiently at much smaller wind speeds while generating 100 or 200 kilowatts of power, depending on the model.

The turbines are designed to start in five mile per hour wind and reach its top rate of speed at 18.5 miles per hour. Large turbines need 26 to 34-mile-per-hour winds to reach capacity and don't start working until much higher wind speeds.

Another of the advantages of the new turbine is its cost and maintenance procedures.

If one of the huge wind generators goes down, a 800-ton crane that costs \$100,000 to travel to the site, \$25,000 a day to stay and \$100,000 to return home has to be called in.

Cross-country walker reaches Saint Louis, MO

B. J. Hill, the Massachusetts man who is walking across America to collect messages for the next president, has reached Chester, IL, according to the latest information.

Hill came through Ringgold county as part of this trip.

"Crossing the Mississippi, from the west into the east at the Saint Louis Arch represents a milestone to this walk," Hill wrote. "I'm more than halfway through my 4,200 mile trek, and I just mailed home my first book which was full with letters from California to Missouri."

Hill said he even noticed people with whom he talks react a little differently when they realize he's walked this far.

"Coincidentally, under the Arch, I met another cross-country trekker, Nick Moffatt of England, who is walking from New York City to Los Angeles to raise money for the British and American Legions," Hill wrote.

He has walked 2,495 miles since leaving San Francisco on March 1. He has collected over 1,000 messages for the next president.

Weitzel sees change in wind acceptance

There has been quite a change in the way people think of wind energy over the last few years, Dr. Kyle Weitzel said in visiting about the Heartland Energy Solutions projects.

He noted that in 1993 when he was first starting in the wind energy engineering, people often asked him if he could make any money in his profession.

Contrast that with a wind power conference recently where 13,000 people took part.

Shell Oil is the world's largest wind energy company while British Petroleum is the largest solar electricity producer, he noted.

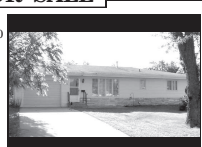
He noted that small generators are popular with Mongolian travelers, who stick up their wind turbines to provide electricity to power televisions in their tents.
